NAME OF CHILD, YEAR LEVEL, REASON FOR ABSENCE *eg If late approximately what time will your child arrive etc.*

A medical certificate is required if a student is away for more than 3 days. For any planned extended absence, an explanatory letter to the Principal requesting permission to be exempt from school is required.

We are pleased to inform our school families that there will be no increase in school fees for the 2024 school year.

Catholic Education SA has announced it will freeze tuition fees at its 84 Diocesan schools for the 2024 school year.

"We recognise that cost-of-living increases are putting significant pressure on families," says Dr Neil McGoran, Executive Director, Catholic Education SA.

"Growth in enrolments across the State in our 101 Catholic Schools, together with prudent financial management, puts us in a position where we are able to hold tuition fees at this year's level."

Dr McGoran said the fee-freeze will not impact the quality of education.

"We're committed to keeping school fees as low as possible and ensuring a Catholic education is affordable and accessible to all."

Since 2019, Catholic Education SA has been implementing the Making Catholic Education More Affordable Initiative to ensure Catholic schools are accessible to any family who wants their child to have a Catholic education.

In addition to the fee-freeze, further fee remissions are available to any family who is struggling to pay school fees due to financial difficulties. Families should contact Virginia Reimann on <u>virginia.reimann@mcc.catholic.</u> <u>edu.au</u> for more information.

Holocaust Excursion - Year 10 History

As part of the 10 History curriculum students study World War II. A new museum was opened in 2020 in Wakefield Street around the Holocaust, and on Thursday 24 August, Mrs Vlahos and I took a group of students to investigate this amazing resource. After completing a 150-word persuasive argument convincing me that it would benefit their studies, 20 students were selected to attend.

The day started with listening to Tamas the Education Coordinator explaining a few key things about the Holocaust, doing some primary source analysis activities and questions then doing the Holocaust static museum tour for about 30 minutes. They worked in collaboration to find information and answer questions related to



each of the 6 South Australian survivors.

The students really enjoyed hearing about the stories of the Holocaust survivors and the lesson learnt was that the prejudice and discrimination of the past should help us today and, in the future, to try and prevent some of these things happening again.

STEM Day Out

On 4 August 2023, our group of short-term exchange students from Year 10 and 11, were invited to attend a STEM Day Out with the Oliphant participants at the Wayville Show Grounds.

As students from overseas we didn't really know what to expect. Actually, it is not really common in our countries to go on an excursion, that is why we were really excited about the idea to discover new things. Although, we already knew that the excursion was about technology, but we didn't expect to see so many different things. Indeed the first thing we saw was not about technology. It was about the diverse animals (reptiles...) that live in Australian nature. There were rangers who were there to talk about how we can protect the fauna and flora of Australia. We were surprised to see so many different native species in Australia compared to our country's biodiversity.

Nevertheless, the big part of this was obviously about technology. We saw so many different things from

so many areas of STEM, which were each very interesting, especially the part about space science, which was just stunning. We had the experience to look through a telescope and also learnt how a satellite is made. Furthermore, a really cool part was to meet new students from hundreds of other schools around Adelaide. It was really exciting to learn new things about the school system and their way of living. Also we were really impressed by the involvement of MCC students who entered the Oliphant Science Competition. The models that they created were amazing.

To sum up, we had a lot of different insights into different topics which were really helpful to get a better understanding of the South Australian school system. Moreover, it showed us the multiple opportunities and experiences that schools like MCC provides for their students.
